

The holiday season is fast approaching andyou know what that means... SHOPPING! I'm sure all of you are looking forward to that with bated breath, (humor).

With that in mind, it's not too soon to start thinking about safety while we're out. Not long ago most criminal activity revolved around homes and vehicles being broken into with criminals stealing your property. This type of crime still takes place, but with the increasing number of security systems being utilized it has become a lot tougher to commit a break-in without being caught.

Criminals are a crafty bunch and spend most of their "off the clock" time devising new ways to take advantage of the innocent. Local law enforcement is seeing a new trend which involves the criminal element stalking local business establishments such as large retail and grocery stores, malls and strip centers with multiple businesses looking for innocent victims. They look for areas that are very busy with pedestrian traffic where they might be able to grab your property and run without being noticed by anyone other than you. By the time you get help it seems that they have disappeared into thin air. The bad guys can be on foot or in a vehicle, and it takes place both night and day. We have been advised of several incidents where a vehicle will drive through a parking lot until they notice someone that is not paying attention and drive up behind them, a suspect will then lean out a window and grab a purse or property and flee without ever exiting the vehicle. Inside stores, criminals follow a person and when they aren't looking, walk up and steal property without you even knowing. There are many ways that criminals take advantage of you in these types of settings but, just like protecting your homes and autos there are ways that you can just about eliminate the chance of you or your loved ones becoming a victim in one of these situations.

The most important thing you need to remember is "PAY ATTENTION TO YOUR SURROUNDINGS"!! It's simple but you would be surprised at the people that get wrapped up in the moment and forget to watch what's going on around them. These types of criminal acts rely on the element of surprise. If they see that you are watching they will move on and leave you alone. Here are just a few things that you can do to protect vourself:

- 1. If possible don't shop alone. Criminals look for unsuspecting individuals that have their hands full of groceries or other items and aren't paying attention. If you're by yourself and have your hands full, it's hard to pay close attention to your surroundings.
- Before entering or exiting a business take a quick look around at the area. If you see something that's out of place go back inside the store or get back in your car. If necessary call store security or the police.
- 3. When you exit make sure that you have your keys out and ready to enter your vehicle.

These are just a few of the many ways of protecting yourself. The main thing is to use common sense when in these environments and you will lessen your chances of being a victim.

## **SEPTEMBER 10, 2013**

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. by President Sharon Kuester. Members present were Sharon, Ron Halk, Lloyd Bratton and Elizabeth Davis. Almost 40 residents filled the clubhouse. List of those who signed up is available.

The minutes of the August 13, 2013 meeting were approved as read.

### **REPORTS**

**Maintenance** – Written report read and approved.

## Security -

Sheriff's report read. Earlier this month, OCV experienced 16 incidents which included break-ins, thefts and aggravated robbery. Lloyd explained that a 15 year old boy (who committed most of the thefts) was apprehended by police, released, and captured again when he went back to stealing across FM 1960. He is being held by police at this time. Many residents were frightened and concerned by this unusual rash of events. Our Sheriff's department is handling these cases.

## Treasury –

Written reports read and approved. Sharon read the monthly report in Jon's absence. The board has requested a report from the Auditors.

### Recreation -

Oral report accepted. This is Elizabeth's slow season as far as Recreation is concerned. So she has our Fall Festival to keep her occupied... and the removal of swim team sponsor's signs from our pool storehouse. Soon she will be working on repairs to our pool deck for the 2014 season.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

Pipeline negotiations have slowed.

A long question and answer period was held to help satisfy residents quest for information regarding possible changes in Oak Creek Village.



# **CERTIFY** YOUR YARD

There are many of you out there that want to help wildlife but because of your job and the demands of family you feel you don't have the time. There IS something you can do and you can do it right in your own backyard. Your yard can become a Certified Wildlife Habitat site through

the National Wildlife Federation. Whether you live in an apartment, in a high-rise or on a 10-acre ranch, you can create a haven for wildlife. You can even have your school or business certified. Community organizations can get areas certified as well. You'd be one of 150,000 certified sites across the country. There are four requirements for getting your property certified. You must provide water, food, cover and a place to raise young. Examples of food sources are native plants, berries, nectar and seeds. The water source can be something as simple as a birdbath, or you may have a stream or pond on your property. Wildlife requires cover in order to feel safe. Mature trees, a brush pile or even a roosting box placed by you can provide the needed cover. Many of the same places the wildlife use for cover can also be used to raise young. Examples of places to raise young are dense shrubs, a nesting box or vegetation. Once you have provided the essential elements, you can become a Certified Wildlife Habitat.

The biggest benefit you will receive is being able to watch the wildlife activity in your yard and having the satisfaction of knowing you are helping the animals. The National Wildlife Federation also offers you a free one-year subscription to the National Wildlife magazine, a personalized



certificate and quarterly habitat tips emailed to you. Yard signs that say you are a Certified Wildlife Habitat sites are available for purchase.
