

OCV President's Letter

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

When you read this, we will have once again made it through August. Personally, I think August is the best month to go on vacation - away from Houston, but this year was better: more rain, less heat.

The largest on-going issue in the village currently is the appearance of some of our residences. AJ works diligently, with help from the rest of us, but we have two major problems. A few years ago, homes were sold to people who really did not qualify, and now is when they are giving up and abandoning their houses. We are left looking at very unkempt lots, while foreclosure and reselling procedures wend their very slow and bureaucratic way through the system. We contact the banks. and do what we can, but it is a slow process. We have a street or two that were particularly depressing a couple of years ago that are now looking like old times, so this, too, shall pass away, but it takes time. The other problem, and maybe part of the first one, is that some people just do not seem to see that their property does not look like their neighbors. Here is where a little peer pressure maybe could be used. I know it takes diplomacy, but it's better than doing nothing except gnashing your teeth (which is bad for your dental health). I see where home prices and demand have been rising nicely lately, and this may help because some people who have been renting out their houses because they could not sell them, may be able to and we may start getting buyers who will take care of their property.

The other issue is trash cans. This is one we can all do something about. Did you know that your trash cans are to be stored *out of public view*? This means you cannot line them up neatly along the side of your house. Put them around the corner, inside the fence, if you must. On trash day, put them outside the fence and move them back at the end of the day. Also, please don't take them to the curb. We have back door pick-up, so that the village does not look tacky, and so that we don't have cans rolling into the street, impeding traffic. If you have trash issues, call me.

Watch for a couple of interesting things coming up. One is a meeting for residents about our water district. This will be held at the clubhouse in mid-September. The other is a community-wide celebration of National Night Out --- Texas version, in the park, the first weekend in October. Check the Newsletter for details, and I'll

Our fellow RFI members knocked on doors of some of our residences offering to assist them in improving the appearances of their yards. Our members put their boots on, loaded up the garden tools, used their own money to purchase items used to help those in need. You all were instrumental in bringing more awareness to the OCV Board of the urgency to encourage all residents to comply with the deed restrictions, even encouraging the Board to approve the removal of dead trees on one resident's home, which was eventually accomplished.

Do Panhandlers Bother You?

If panhandlers bother you, you can call the Harris County Sheriff's Office at 713-221-6000 when you see one in the County. When the Harris County recording starts, hit #1 and you will be taken to a dispatcher. Tell them that there is a solicitor (panhandler)

at the corner of this and that. They will ask you some basic description question and your name and address. There has never been follow up, so don't be uncomfortable giving this out. MANY of these people are NOT "nice" homeless people. The police tell us that MANY are criminals with records in YOUR community.

Security News® from Lt. R. Glaze

I'll start by taking a moment to thank all of you that used the vacation watch program offered by the Precinct 4 Constable's office. As this summer comes to a close we have seen the largest number of users ever for the North Central district. If any of you are still unfamiliar with this program here's a brief explanation of the program...

If you're leaving home for a day or more you can visit our website at www.cd4.hctx.net and fill out a Vacation Watch under our Online Forms section. After we receive the watch request deputies will begin making security checks on your home throughout the 24 hour period for each day you're away. Deputies will check doors, windows and other areas to make sure everything is secure along with looking for any other issues. We had a deputy recently performing a check when they noticed water coming from a back door of the home. We made a call to the emergency contact person (neighbor), listed on the online form. Turned out a pipe had sprung a leak and was slowly beginning to flood the home. With the help of the neighbor we were able to cut the water and prevent any further damage.

Another area that has seen an upswing in usage is the Extra Patrol section under Online Forms. It works much the same as the Watch program, and has been very useful in allowing the public to pass on information to the Constable's office so that we can investigate the issue. Head to our website and under Online Forms fill out an Extra Patrol request. It allows you to sit down at your convenience and pass on non-emergency issues such as suspicious or unusual activity.

By the time you read this another school year should be underway. Where did summer go? Be sure to pay attention to the school zones in your area and keep a close eye out for the kids making their way to school. We will also have new drivers on the roads heading to and from school, so take your time and stay safe. While looking over the enrollment numbers for several of our schools, I see that the numbers have risen since last year meaning we'll see more kids than ever. Some of us are fortunate enough to have a school close enough to allow our kids to walk to school. For younger kids, I suggest that you reaffirm the rules for not talking to strangers. Make sure that they know to tell an adult if they see any out of the ordinary activity. If you walk your kids to school and see any such activity, call law enforcement immediately to report it. I hope everyone has a great school year.

As our kids go back to school some of us will also be headed back to work after taking the summer off. Many of us may have gotten a little lax with our security precautions around the house, so make sure and get back into the habit of properly securing the home and cars if you're headed back to work. Lock doors and set alarms if you leave. Tuesday, October 2nd is National Night Out, so make it a point to step outside and meet your neighbors!

Fight the Bite!

Reduce your Risk

BBQs, gardening, swimming pools and hikes...and mosquitoes. Enjoy the outdoors, but remember to protect yourself and your family from mosquito-borne diseases such as West Nile Virus. Your best defense against being bitten is simply to be prepared. Help Fight the Bite!

- When outdoors, use an insect repellent containing the active ingredient DEET, Picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR3535 to reduce exposure to mosquito bites. <u>Always apply as directed on the</u> <u>label</u>. Do not allow young children to apply repellent to themselves; have an adult do it for them.
- If possible, wear long-sleeved clothing and long pants when outdoors at dawn and dusk which are peak mosquito biting times.
- Place mosquito netting over infant carriers when you are outdoors with infants.
- Don't feed the storm drains. Sweep up lawn clippings, leaves and tree limbs from sidewalks and driveways.
- Remove/empty containers that can hold water such as flowerpots, buckets, tires, toys and plastic swimming pools. Birdbaths and pet water bowls should be changed at least twice a week.
- Cover your boat or store in a covered place. Drain any standing water and make sure the bilge pump is working. Turn over canoes, kayaks and small boats to store upside down.
- Keep rain gutters clean and draining and repair any outdoor household leaks.
- When watering the lawn, be aware of any excess water that may accumulate. Fill in low areas around the yard.
- When mosquitoes are noticed in your yard, spray with an outdoor mosquito spray. <u>Be sure to use according to directions on the label.</u>
 To control mosquitoes in your house, use a "flying insect spray". <u>Be sure to use according to directions on the label.</u>
- Household pets can be exposed to West Nile Virus (WNV).
 Contact your veterinarian for more information.

Statement of Revenue & Expense

Have confirmed total receipts of \$5,008.83 received from 6 of the 14 sub-division accounts that were most delinquent which had been sent to the lawyer back in January 2012. We are working on updating account balances and looking to send follow-up letters. Also working with Accountant to look at next 10 most delinquent accounts to send to lawyer for first demand letter.
