With this in mind, we need at least 2 Block Captains for each street to keep us aware of what is happening on your street. This will enable us to build a network of homes to cover the entire neighborhood

and build on the existing Captains we have for our Neighborhood Watch so far. As to the positions for Neighborhood Watch, these volunteers will basically be the "Eyes and Ears" of OUR NEIGHBORHOOD. If you notice any negative activity call the 'NON-EMERGENCY' NUMBER 713-221-6000 OR 911 IF APPROPRIATE. Keep these numbers on your speed dial and cell phone for quicker action. It would be a good idea to call the other Block Captain on your street to initiate the Block Captain Network we plan to establish. We realize that the times dictate two working professionals in many of our homes and that your volunteer time is limited with both work and children responsibilities but, the more Captains we can get, no matter the time you have available, the safer we can keep our Small Village. For those of us that have been here more than 30 years, it is heartening to see so many young people that have chosen to make Oak Creek Village their home. We will be having a meeting of ALL INTERESTED VOL-UNTEERS sometime in November. If, in the meantime, you would call to let us know of your interest to allow for time and space. VOTE FOR ADDITIONAL SECURITY!!!

Each household should be receiving in the mail in the next week a letter along with a ballot asking for your support to add an additional shift from the Sheriff's department giving us 24 hour security. There will be an additional small cost added to your water bill for adding this additional service, this amount will be shown in the letter. Residents are required to vote on this in order to give permission to the HOA to have the added security and to add the additional fee to our water bill. The cost at the present time for each household is \$18.50 per month. By adding this additional small amount you will have the comfort of knowing we have 24 hour Sheriff's protection in our subdivision. For those of you who have personally been victims of crimes, this should be a relief. As stated in the letter, the ballots are to be returned no later than December 15th.




To be eligible for assistance, families who receive the meals



As much as I hate to say it, the opportunity exists for any-
one of us to become a victim of crime these days. Criminals
are always looking for an easy target or an opportunity crime.
Unfortunately we provide them with too many opportunities to
do just that, such as unlocked car doors, a residential window
left unlocked by accident, etc. One of the latest crimes involves
wallets being taken from purses while shopping. Criminals
scout the store for an easy target. They stalk their victim and
simply wait for her to lean away from the shopping cart for just
a moment and then they grab the wallet. In most cases the vic-
tim doesn't even realize their wallet is gone until they check out.
The above information brings me to my article for this month.

The above information brings me to my article for this month. We need to start making it harder for these guys to commit crimes! When I say we, I include myself. Recently I had the misfortune of becoming a victim of crime. Someone broke into my vehicle and stole numerous items. I blame myself since they were left them in plain view, thereby asking the criminal to just come and get it. I was lazy and made the mistake of thinking that it wouldn't happen to me. The old adage of "Practice what you Preach" comes to mind here. What's worse is that I hadn't taken serial numbers or marked any of them for identification purposes, so unless a miracle takes place I most likely will never see my property again.

So how do we make it tougher on the criminals? Use some of the standard precautions I've mentioned before. They do work for both homes and automobiles. The most important rule is to make sure and lock your doors. Set alarms both at home and in the car no matter how long you're going to be away. Don't leave expensive items such as electronics, expensive clothes, etc. in plain view. When you're in the store keep your personal items secure in a closed purse or out of easy reach. Keep an eye on your surroundings. Most of these are common sense things that we must get in the habit of doing on a regular basis.

Some of you may have seen recently where the Pct. 4 Constable's Office arrested several persons for vehicle burglaries and recovered a large amount of property. While interviewing the suspects we found that they mainly concentrated on unlocked vehicles, which according to them were in abundance. Most had valuable items in plain view making the crime that much easier to commit.

Let's say you take all the necessary precautions and you still become a victim of theft. You can still lessen the impact of the crime and possibly help locate your property by documenting serial and model numbers and by keeping record of any other identifying information. If possible place a name or phone number on the property to aid identification if it is recovered. Add to your documentation by using your camera or video camera. This not only helps with recovery and identification but will also be a big help with your insurance reports.

If your property is stolen we can list the items with their identification numbers in a database available to authorities. Good documentation will help recover your property. Stolen property is recovered on a regular basis and many times can't be returned because there is no way to know who owns it.

Whether you were born here or you got here as fast as you could, everyone agrees that Texas is a great place live. But, how much do you actually know about Texas? We know it's big, we know it's hot and we know we love our country music. I'm talking about how much you know about the great outdoors.

About 15% of Texas is covered in forestland. Trees you'll find in abundance are pine, mesquite, oak, pecan, hickory and cypress. Much of the state is desert but it is alive with the color of nearly 5,000 species of wild flowers.

Ranked second in the country for inland water, Texas boasts large reservoirs, lakes and rivers, and miles of coastal shoreline.

The diverse landscape of Texas provides habitat for countless species of wildlife and is considered a birding paradise as most bird species can be found in Texas.

For outdoor enthusiasts, there are ample opportunities and possibilities for outdoor fun. We have 55 state parks, 2 national parks, 4 state forests, 4 national forests and 11 national wildlife refuges.

OCTOBER 8, 2013

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. by President Sharon Kuester who immediately turned it over to Security Director, Lloyd Bratton, who introduced OCV's deputies, Mike Malloy and David Gilbert. They were accompanied by Sergeant Hank Weirich. These men came to discuss the series of burglaries perpetrated in OCV in August. The 40-odd residents attending the meeting were very interested in their comments and posed many questions. Residents also offered some solutions that had helped solve previous problems. They were interested in our traffic troubles and the officers suggested some ways to curb these problems. These discussions went on for over an hour.

At 8:15 p.m. the business meeting of the board resumed. Members present were Sharon, Ron Halk, Lloyd Bratton, and Jon Whisler.

The minutes of the September 10, 2013 meeting were approved as corrected. The Auditors furnish the board with their reports...no request is necessary.

REPORTS

Maintenance – Written report read and approved. Ron reported that Matt McKay had done good work on the Pool Storehouse. Second half can now begin.

Security – Sheriff's report read. Lloyd told residents not to hesitate to call the sheriff when something doesn't seem right. Better safe than sorry.

Treasury – Written reports read and approved. Cost of 24 hour security discussed. It was estimated that addition to water bill would be around \$10.00 per month. Security cameras for the subdivision were also discussed.

OLD BUSINESSS

Pipeline business should be settled in about one week.

A motion was made and approved to put on extra security for Halloween and the two nights following it.

Volunteers are needed for Neighborhood Watch.

NEW BUSINESS

Estimates are needed to repair chair seats for the clubhouse.

Meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.




